A revelatory documentary about "the lost

Bob Dylan", the American singer-songwriter Rodriguez, who disappeared after making two cult albums in the Seventies. In the meantime, his music became an anthem for the liberal anti-Apartheid movement. In South Africa, It's worth seeing for the soundtrack alone.

The Dark Knight Rises Christopher Nolan, 12A (164min)

The last in Nolan's Batman trilogy is as ambitious and bombastic as blockbusters get, with widescreen mayhem, thousands of extras, hyper-kinetic effects, and a roiling, twisting plot. Christian Bale, once again, plays Bruce, Wayne, Tom Hardy is his nemesis Bane, and Anne Hathaway is Selina Kyle.

Magic Mike Steven Soderbergh, 15 (110min)

Lipsmackin', crotch grabbin', lady pleasin' entertainment, set in a male dance establishment in Florida. The comedy stars Channing Tatum and Alex Pettyfer as builders turned male strippers, with a terrific performance by Matthew McConaughey as the joint's leather clad King of Sleaze. So the lack of plot doesn't really matter.

The Genius of Hitchcock
